#### **WISCONSIN ECONOMIC FORECAST – AUGUST 2025**

- The August national forecast incorporates the provisions in the One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA). There are similarities and some important differences between previous assumptions included in the national forecast.
- S&P Global Market Intelligence projects GDP growth of 1.7% in 2025, 2.4% in 2026, and 1.7% in 2027.
- Stronger near-term GDP growth keeps unemployment lower than previously expected, peaking at 4.5% by mid-2026
- Core Personal Consumption Expenditure (PCE) inflation is projected to peak at 3.8% in late 2025 before easing to 2.3% by end-2026.

The U.S. economy rebounded to a 3.0% growth rate in Q2 2025, sharply reversing a 0.5% Q1 contraction. This swing was driven by a business rush to import goods ahead of tariffs in Q1 and a subsequent inventory drawdown in Q2, which masked a more stable underlying trend in domestic demand.

The August forecast reflects the One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA), which makes 2017 personal tax cuts permanent and introduces limited relief for tip income and overtime pay. The bill introduces full expensing for business investment, which has only a modest effect on capital spending. The OBBA marginally raises the average effective corporate tax rate, reducing after-tax profits.

Near-term economic growth gets a lift from a surge in federal defense outlays. Yet, this boost is counteracted by a fiscal

drag from reductions in key social safety net programs (Medicaid, healthcare premium credits, SNAP, and student loan forgiveness) and the effects of higher tariffs. States are expected to absorb more Medicaid costs. The combined impact of these measures over time reduces disposable income and transfer-supported consumption, while higher tariffs add to price pressures, pushing core PCE inflation to a projected peak of 3.8% in late 2025.

U.S. personal income is forecast to grow 4.8% in 2025, driven by a 4.1% rise in wages and salaries. However, real disposable income growth is projected to slow to a modest 1.6%, down from 2.7% in 2024. This slowdown will contribute to subdued consumer spending growth of 1.9%, a deceleration from the 2.8% pace recorded in 2024. Meanwhile, business fixed investment is expected to decelerate from 3.6% in 2024 to 2.5% growth in 2025.

Wisconsin's nominal personal income growth is forecast to moderate to 4.4% in 2025, down from 4.9% in 2024. This deceleration is primarily driven reflecting weaker gains in wages, property income, and proprietor income, partly offset by faster growth in transfer receipts.

Wages and salaries in Wisconsin rose 5.2% in 2024 but are projected to slow to 4.0% growth in 2025, compared with a nationwide deceleration from 5.8% to 4.7%, highlighting easing labor market tightness.



Job growth continues to lag behind the pace of recent years. According to the latest CES (Current Employment Statistics) data, Wisconsin employment grew 2.8% in 2022, 1.5% in 2023, and 0.6% in 2024. A similar slowdown is evident nationally, where employment growth fell from 4.3% in 2022 to 1.3% in 2024. In the first seven months of 2025, Wisconsin employment grew 0.5%, compared with 1.1% nationwide. Looking ahead to 2026–2028, the outlook points to flat employment in Wisconsin and growth of less than 0.5% for the U.S.

#### **Employment Growth**





Wisconsin's largest employment sector—trade, transportation, and utilities—was nearly flat in 2024 and is expected to remain so in 2025 and 2026. The second-largest sector, education and health services, has been the state's main growth driver since late 2023 and is contributing more than half of total employment growth in 2025. Manufacturing, now the third largest sector in Wisconsin, is expected to continue losing jobs over the forecast period.

During 2023 and 2024, total employment grew faster than

private employment, which was outpaced by strong growth in government employment. This pattern has only been observed during recession periods over the last 25 years. The outlook suggests this pattern will reverse from 2025 onward, with government employment becoming a drag on total growth. Wisconsin's unemployment rate stood at 3.1% in July, slightly more than a percentage point below the U.S. rate of 4.2%.


# Wisconsin Employment Largest Sectors (in thousands of jobs)

Data from the Wisconsin Realtors Association show existing home sales rose 0.5% in the first seven months of 2025, following a 5.0% gain in 2024 and two consecutive years of double-digit declines. Although the median home price was up 6.2% year-to-date through July 2025, that pace is below the five-year average annual growth rate of 9.3%, signaling a deceleration in price appreciation.

With mortgage rates and home prices elevated, housing affordability remains near historic lows. From 2019 to 2024, Wisconsin's median home price rose 56% versus a 28.5% gain in wages. By July 2025, the share of median U.S. income needed for a median-priced home reached 47%, well above the 30% affordability benchmark.
